Annex 3: Other war crimes according to State practice as reflected in ICRC Study on Customary International Humanitarian Law

In international armed conflicts:

- 1. Slavery and deportation to slave labour,
- 2. Collective punishments,
- 3. Despoliation of the wounded, sick, shipwrecked or dead,
- 4. Attacking or ill-treating a parlementaire or bearer of the flag of truce,
- 5. Unjustifiable delay in the repatriation of prisoners of war and civilians,
- 6. The practice of apartheid or other inhuman or degrading practices involving outrages on personal dignity based on racial discrimination,
- 7. Launching an indiscriminate attack resulting in loss of life or injury to civilians or damage to civilian objects,
- 8. Launching an attack against works or installations containing dangerous forces in the knowledge that such attack will cause excessive incidental loss of civilian life, injury to civilians or damage to civilian objects.

In non-international armed conflicts:

- 1. Using prohibited weapons,
- 2. Launching an indiscriminate attack resulting in death or injury to civilians, or an attack in the knowledge that it will cause excessive incidental civilian loss, injury or damage,
- 3. Making non-defended localities and demilitarized zones the object of attack,
- 4. Using human shields,
- 5. Slavery,
- 6. Collective punishments,
- 7. Using starvation of civilians as a method of warfare by depriving them of objects indispensable to their survival, including by impeding relief supplies.
