

SOUTH SUDAN: Facts and figures 2017

The ICRC's work in South Sudan, in collaboration with the South Sudan Red Cross, focuses on visiting detainees to monitor their living conditions and treatment, providing basic aid and medical care, improving access to water and sanitation, and reconnecting families separated by ongoing conflict.

Below is an overview of the ICRC's work in South Sudan in 2017.

To help respond to people's most urgent needs and to help them build resilience, the ICRC together with the South Sudan Red Cross (SSRC) have:

- Distributed over 61,700 monthly household food rations, equivalent to more than 7,300 metric tons of food, to almost 557,900 people in need;
- Provided essential household kits (blankets, buckets, jerry cans, mats, mosquito nets, soap and tarpaulins) and fishing kits to over **257,900** people;
- Provided over 511,000 people with staple crops, vegetable seeds and tools for farming;
- Vaccinated more than 1,007,400 heads of livestock and treated 310,700 animals, benefitting over 882,000 people.
- Improved access to safe drinking water for some 242,000 people through the drilling of eight boreholes and digging of eight water wells, the rehabilitation or construction of 18 water yards and 26 hand pumps, and supported maintenance and expansion of the urban water supply system of Juba town.
- Maintained two emergency surface water treatment units benefitting more than 60,000 people in Juba and Aburoc, and provided safe water and an adequate sanitary environment for 80,000 persons during six ICRC food distributions.

To help improve access to health and provision of surgical care the ICRC has:

- Performed nearly **4,308** surgical interventions;
- Evacuated 834 weapon wounded people and treated 1,685 in total in ICRC supported hospitals;
- Set up a field hospital in Ganyliel (60 beds) and three Mobile Surgical Teams.
- Provided more than 83,813 outpatient consultations;
- Provided antenatal consultations for 6,754 women, safe deliveries for 1,359 women and vaccinated 14,892 women and children;
- Carried out renovation and extension works in **five** health facilities, and **three** Physical Rehabilitation Centers.
- Assisted **3,156** people with disabilities with mobility devices and physiotherapy.

To help improve conditions for detainees the ICRC has:

- Visited some **5,053** detainees throughout the country;
- Improved living conditions, including access to health care, and implemented preventive and curative measures against malnutrition for more than 4,000 detainees in eleven Central Prisons;
- Facilitated the voluntary repatriation of **125** released persons.

To help reconnect family members separated by the conflict the ICRC and SSRC have:

• Facilitated more than 65,890 phone calls between family members separated by the conflict;

- Helped exchange close to 5,200 Red Cross messages with family news;
- Reunited 92 vulnerable people, including children, with their families.
- Transferred **37** women and their children back to their place of origin.

To promote knowledge and respect for International Humanitarian Law (IHL) and International Human Rights Law (IHRL) the ICRC has:

- Trained over 2,300 military personnel on IHL and nearly 1,000 police personnel on IHRL;
- Raised awareness among almost 900 weapon bearers and health staff on safe access to health care;
- Over **19,000** beneficiaries and **16,700** community members had access to life-saving and actionable information about the ICRC and its humanitarian services.
